JOIN THE BATTLE TO SAVE BRITAIN'S BUMBLEBEES

DR NIKKI GAMMANS of the Bumblebee Conservation Trust delivered a powerful November talk about the campaign to save Britain's bees after the disastrous decline of recent years.

A Fellow of the Royal Entomological Society, she is project manager for the re-introduction of the short haired bumblebee in Kent and East Sussex. This is one of two native bumblebee species to have gone extinct. It was last spotted in 1988 at Dungeness.

Dr Gammans first became fascinated in social insects when studying biology and ecology at university in



Edinburgh. Her doctorate was on ants and seed dispersal, her post-doctorate the invasion of European ants in North America.

She explained that there were over 250 bee species in Britain, including 24 remaining species of bumblebee. Honeybees were another species and the rest all species of solitary bee such as leafcutter, mason and mining bees.



more efficient pollinators and honeybees were domesticated to produce honey, beeswax and royal jelly in their huge and complex societies, bumblebees were essential for pollinating crops and wildflowers.

With 97% of wildflower meadows lost since World War 2, bumblebee numbers had declined dramatically through loss of their food sources. Eight others among the 24 species were also now rare. **Continued overleaf.**

Once again, as in October, there was a slight shortfall on the 105 members - 20% of the Bookham u3a total - needed at the Barn Hall for an AGM quorum but this time the rules did not require it so the election was able to proceed anyway.

Chairman Chris Middleton said there had been a 17% reduction in members overall since March 2020, roughly in line with the average for u3as nationally. The need for a Vice-Chairman was also mentioned.

The short-haired bumblebee (*Bombus subterraneus*) was once widespread across southern England and found as far north as Humberside. But from the 1950s, its population distribution became isolated and patchy. Its decline resulted from the loss of the species-rich grassland habitats on which it depends. It was declared extinct in 2000.

The short-haired bumblebee reintroduction project aims to reintroduce this lost species, raise awareness of bumblebee and flower meadow declines generally, increase rare bumblebee populations, and recreate and advise on managing flower-rich areas.

The project has been running since 2009 and works with farmers, conservation groups, smallholders and other landowners to create flower-rich habitat within a release area of Dungeness and Romney Marsh in Kent and East Sussex.

This is now the trust's longest running project. Sweden has one of Europe's only surviving populations of the shorthaired bumblebee and the aim is to reintroduce a population from there.

Recreating essential habitat is the key aim and since 2012, available land for the project where owners and farmers are being advised by the trust has grown from 100 to 2460 hectares.





Our gardens have a crucial role in linking food source habitats for bumblebees. Wildflowers, fruit trees, and long flowering plantings are key, however large our outdoor space may be. Even balconies, patios and hanging baskets can make a difference.



Monitoring has shown that several other species of rare bumblebees have increased as a result of the project. On nature reserves, their numbers are up eight-fold with both advice and planting.

The rare Ruderal bumblebee has increased the most. Dungeness is now one of the country's best places for the species. With the right levels of pollen and nectar and the end of pesticides, rare bumblebees have been recorded in areas where they had not been seen for up to 25 years. 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AN OPEN LETTER TO U3A MEMBERS FROM LIZ THACKRAY, CHAIR OF THE THIRD AGE TRUST

The past 18 months have been difficult for all of us as we have found ourselves living lives in ways we never expected. None of us could have foreseen a worldwide pandemic, lockdowns, and all the restrictions on our way of living.

Although we are now moving towards a time when it is likely we need to learn to live with Covid, many of us are still nervous about returning to what was our normal way of life, while others cannot wait to meet up again.

Whether we like it or not we have all been affected by the changes in our lifestyle and expectations over the past months. This is irrespective of whether or not we have ourselves suffered a Covid infection or have experienced the suffering – and perhaps death – of close friends or family members.

We have all made adaptations in our lifestyle as we have adopted technology or gone out of our way in different ways to ensure we keep in touch with our friends, especially those most vulnerable.

As u3a members, we have benefitted enormously from the work undertaken by our local committees, by the support provided by volunteers working directly with the Third Age Trust and the work undertaken by the staff team.

Without the enormous amount of voluntary effort by so many people, our movement would not be continuing to thrive. However unfortunately, sometimes surviving through adversity can lead to us not always appreciating properly the support we receive.

As u3a members, we belong to a movement built on principles of mutual aid and self-help. Although we may join the u3a in order to learn a new skill or to enjoy meeting new people, we also join a movement where we are all volunteers with something to contribute – and that is our greatest strength! However, we also recognise that the mantra 'by the members, for the members' is not always sufficient. Changes in legislation over the past 40 years have led to all voluntary organisations needing to develop new procedures in order to stay legal – and never has this been more true than in the past months of pandemic.

The u3a is fortunate in that we have a small group of staff employed to support our movement. However, at times we need to remember that there are fewer than 20 staff members, not all full-time, supporting a movement of well over 1000 u3as and over 400,000 u3a members.

Those staff have suffered the same restrictions and pressures as the rest of us through the past months, but many of them have worked far more than their contracted hours in order to provide us with information, advice and support.

Sometimes we all get impatient when we do not receive answers to queries as speedily as we would wish. Sometimes we do not like the advice we receive. Sometimes we want to argue and complain that information or advice is inaccurate.

I would urge us all, including me, to remember the staff team are only human. When we feel like complaining about not receiving a response to a query, or difficulty accessing a named member of staff or getting the telephone answered, or not being able to find information on the website, we all need to remember we are dealing with human beings who are doing their best under difficult circumstances.



Parties.) As scientific awareness has developed, climate change has gone from being a fringe issue to a global priority and now seriously threatens our children and grandchildren.


Trust u3a is a working group which followed the run up to COP 26. Its team

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SURREY U3A NETWORK MARKING THE 40TH ANNIVERSARY OF u3a

Next year will mark two very different anniversaries. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee will celebrate her 70 years on the throne - by far the longest reign of any British monarch. But 2022 will also be the 40th birthday of the u3a in Britain, and Surrey Network representatives met last month to discuss the future, hosted by Caroline Sawers of Guildford u3a, Surrey Network chair.

Networks are groups of u3as which choose to work together for mutual benefit. Network Link meetings are held two or three times a year when representatives hear about Third Age Trust developments and share best practice.

Network Link chair Hilary Jones announced the launch of *Network News* this coming January, a three times per annum digital newsletter designed to share ideas, events and news from u3as in Surrey and elsewhere. It will contain links to national mailings and is intended to enhance shared communication.

It will be in addition, of course, to Bookham's own monthly *News Bulletin*. To receive *Network News*, u3a members just have to sign up via the link <u>http://</u> eepurl.com/hJYFnv

Bookham u3a itself dates back only to 1993 but the Network Link's vision for the 40th anniversary year reflects the continuing importance of virtual activities both here and nationwide.

The pandemic has shown how vital online communications and meetings have proved in keeping members in touch with each other. As a result they are clearly here to stay.

The *Network News* is just one of several initiatives to mark the 40th anniversary. u3a members have been invited to create squares for an Anniversary Quilt to be revealed nationally in June. This is seen as demonstrating a positive aspect of ageing.

The High Street Project database has also attracted many members who have spent time surveying their local high streets in detail and assessing recent trends. Results will be announced in 2022.

Other projects include the u3a Wood, launched this September (see October *News Bulletin*). Entitled *Growing the Future*, its success in planting 5000 trees will be assessed next November.

A film project on the u3a vision *Looking Ahead, Not Back* is being discussed for launch in January.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee long weekend in June is planned to see a *Picnic in the Park* theme with u3s teaming up for the celebrations.

A Science and Sporting Festival is planned for July, including a webinar on the theme *Future Foresight and Horizon Scanning*.

Finally, *One Foot in the Future* will feature stories of the part that older members play in the community and there is even an ambitious plan to enter a short play in the Edinburgh Festival fringe.

Also likely to feature more heavily in future is Third Age Trust Trading Ltd (TATTL), a move to supplement u3a membership fees with a commercial arm to help fund the trust.

The *Third Age Matters* magazine which balances editorial articles with substantial advertising revenue, is one feature of this new commercial approach.

Another are likely to be specially selected clothing and other products for the u3a market, branded and sold to members in much the same way as operated by other charities.

To put Bookham u3a into context, we are one of 26 u3as in the Surrey Network. We are roughly in the middle in terms of membership.

Before the pandemic, Guildford u3a used to have 1800 members but is now believed to be nearer to 1200 whereas we now have 530 members.

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THE LIFE OF BENJAMIN FRANKLIN by MARTIN POWER, KINGSTON U3A

Born in 1706, 26 years before George Washington and 37 years before Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin was more 'founding grandfather' than 'founding father' of the American nation.


He combined many of the qualities of the Americans at their best - their can do optimism, resourcefulness, willingness to work hard, good humour, sociability, their generosity and their benevolence.

Drawing on the great man's memoirs, Martin gave our monthly Zoom talk on 9 November. He described Franklin's boyhood in Boston, and how he ran away from his tyrannous elder brother, to whom he was apprenticed.

We learned about the young Franklin's adventurous journey to Philadelphia, where the Quaker citizens befriended him. Through sheer hard work and enterprise, he became Philadelphia's leading newspaper editor and printer.

He played a leading part in setting up its public library, university, and first major hospital, and in introducing paving and lighting to its central streets. He also persuaded householders to pay insurance premiums to finance a town fire brigade.

He declined to profit from his inventions, including the energy-conserving stove,






the lightning-conductor, bifocal spectacles, and a flexible form of catheter to ease the release of trapped urine. Later in life, Franklin spent many years abroad, first in London and then in Paris, as the Americans'

leading diplomat. He secured vital French support for the colonists in their fight for independence from Britain.

As an elderly man, he gracefully urged representatives

of the newly independent United States, meeting in Philadelphia, to be ready to compromise to achieve a new federal constitution. He was also president of Pennsylvania's society for the abolition of slavery.



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MORE NHS VOLUNTEER RESPONDERS NEEDED FOR VACCINATION CENTRES

Have you ever dreamed of standing outside a pharmacy wearing a natty, yellow florescent tabard and handing out masks and hand-sanitiser? It is what I have been doing on a regular basis for the past five months.

Along with thousands of others, I signed up as a steward volunteer to help facilitate the Covid vaccination programme. It now covers flu too. Without this help the rollout would either be much slower or more health workers would have to be diverted from their normal duties – about 2000 people are needed every day.

So what does stewarding involve? I am sure you will have met stewards who directed you around the vaccination site, ensured you have sanitised your hands, and watched while you sat for 15 minutes after your jab, only to leap up and sanitise your chair and anything else you may have touched as soon as you leave.

At times it has been hot, cold, wet and windy but chatting with other volunteers and with people coming in for vaccination, together with the many words of thanks we receive, has made it worthwhile.

It was particularly gratifying recently to hear a nurse say to someone she was vaccinating: 'I see you live in Bookham. I don't know that area but it must be a nice village to live in as many of our volunteers come from Bookham and Fetcham.'

Some people may ask whether volunteers are at greater risk of catching Covid. Everyone at any vaccination site has to wear a mask provided free of charge - it is still a legal requirement in health settings. Areas are always well ventilated and constantly sanitised of course, while gloves are also provided if needed. Obviously it is not a role for anyone particularly vulnerable but otherwise any risk is very low.

The number of people now available to volunteer has fallen with students returning to college/university and other people starting to resume their normal lives.
